
## Reading a Woodblock Print

On Japanese woodblock prints, there are blocks of writing which identify the print's title, series, artist, publisher, and other people involved in its production. These blocks are usually found in the same place, although their locations can vary. Japanese characters (kanji) are read from right to left, top to bottom.

> Title of Print: "Yoshida on the Tokaido Road"

Title of Series: "Thirty-six Views of Mount Fuji" Prints were often part of a series, which people would collect over time. Occasionally, a series would be continued with further editions of prints, depending on its popularity.

> Artist's Signature: Hokusai



## Publisher's Seal:

The publisher was the most important person in the printing process. He decided on which designs to produce, hired the people for production, and marketed the prints. The artist would often incorporate the publisher's name in very clever ways in his design, as you see here.



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
